What we do



The Healthy Relationship Education project works with groups of children and young people aged between 9 and 25, offering interactive, arts-based education programmes in primary and secondary schools as well as out-of-school settings.

The project enables young people to understand and identify the key elements of healthy and unhealthy relationships, challenge myths and tolerance towards violence, and identify the early warning signs of abuse in relationships.



Where we do it



The Prevention Programme is being delivered in all London Boroughs, other than City of London.

In each borough we are working in:

- 3 secondary schools
- 1 Primary School
- 1 out-of-school setting



Why We do it "The Next Generation of Domestic Violence is waiting in the wings" Keir Starmer



- Young people aged 16-24 (Home Office) are at greatest risk of experiencing violence in their relationships and therefore it is vital that they are equipped with the skills to identify, avoid and escape abuse through engaging, age appropriate, schools based prevention programmes
- From Tender's own research and consultations we know that 44% of young people have themselves experienced one or more of the following behaviours in a relationship: being yelled at, humiliated, hit, kicked, slapped, pressured into having sex, pressured into getting married, threatened or checked-up

Hiding in Plain Sight



- Over **75**% of those experiencing abuse did not seek support from anyone and less than **5**% of young people experiencing abuse sought help from a professional (Tender; 2011). The NSPCC found that young women did not report abuse because A) they thought they would not be listened to and B) because they thought they would not be believed and that they themselves felt they were responsible for what had happened.
- Young people tell one another when abuse happens and so in effect are acting as the frontline of support with limited skills to support or signpost or dispel victim blaming attitudes that condone and tolerate.
- There is a severe lack of awareness and confidence amongst teachers to address sexual bullying and relationship violence. (Ocampo; 2007)
- Teachers fear "opening a can of worms". It is therefore even more devastating that PSHE and SRE have not been made a statutory part of the National Curriculum.



We work with young people to:

- identify the warning signs and myths
- have increased confidence and empowerment enabling positive choices to be made
- •Understand the complex nature of violence and abuse violence as it relates to protected characteristics.



Outcomes: what's been achieved so far (since April 2013)



- More than 100,000 number of young people have participated in interactive workshops
- 240 schools and youth settings have had a project take place
- 2,200 teachers and youth workers have undertaken training to recognise and support young people experiencing abuse





85% of participants can identify at least one early warning sign to an abusive relationship

100% know where to disclose

80% of professionals are more confident to use their training in their professional practice

They are faced with so many ways to judge each other; put up so many barriers to a declaration of commitment; have so many self imposed rules and regulations. "It is important that children know how to communicate with each other, not to be manipulated, coerced into doing things they don't want to do. It is important to see how someone can put you down in a passive way slowly chipping away at your self-esteem. Showing them what domineering and controlling behaviour looks like". "We had a girl that tried to commit suicide a few weeks before the project. She had poor attendance. I targeted her to take part as I knew it was over a boy and what was being said about her. She joined in the project and this improved her attendance. She ended up completing her Drama exam and achieving a B." Teacher, secondary school

A changing landscape for Young people and social media

"Children now more than ever are exposed to gangs, violence, graphic images, internet bullying, sexual exploitation. With the internet, children are exposed to behaviours they probably may never have seen or experienced". Teacher, Brent

A changing landscape for Young People in Social media....

- Two-thirds of 13-17 year olds said that they have viewed pornography – and mainly online. Young men make up the majority of consumers. (You Gov, 2008)
- You Gov (2008) also found that 27% of boys are accessing pornography every week with 5% viewing it every day.
- Other studies have shown a significant proportion of young people report receiving pornographic junk mail or instant 'pop ups' or messages whilst generally searching the internet.



"Young people have an increasingly complex world to navigate in order to engage in healthy relationships: healthy relationship education programmes are vital to ensuring that these navigations are successful ones. The chance to work with specialists through the mediums of drama, discussion and scenario based problem solving has opened many students eyes to the stark realities involved in unhealthy relationships. These processes have also firmed up the students understanding of the potential repercussions that unhealthy relationships create where notions of abuse are clarified for young people living in a fast changing and demanding world."

We have a responsibility to equip our young people with skills to defend themselves against abuse and the knowledge of acceptable and healthy behaviours.

Prevention Education works with potential victims but perhaps more importantly, with potential perpetrators.

Prevention Education is about long term investment, with no quick wins or sharp headlines. Wouldn't it be extraordinary to think that one day Refuges and frontline VAWG services are being cut back, not because of the economic environment, but because we just don't need them anymore.
